Communication is KEY

As with most relationships, communication is vital to make certain everyone is "on the same page". This way expectations of both sides can be understood. In the case of MTN hosts and guests, communication is vital to everyone having a good experience.

Unfortunately, sometimes this doesn't happen. We recently received an email from MTN member, "Greg" in Colorado. He stated that they were to host for the first time and really looked forward to it. They cleaned house and had set in the breakfast food they were going to serve, only to have the guest not show up or call. One of the best things about MTN members is that we are all motorcyclists and understand when things go awry and prevent us from arriving when expected. However, not calling or communicating this to the host is... well, just plain rude. In this day and age of cell phones there really is no excuse for not calling as soon as you know you are going to be delayed and letting your host know. They are certain to understand. If you don't call and don't show up, though, they are going to worry that something happened.

The flip side of this is to make sure you are home when your guests are expected to arrive. Last year we had a member arrive at the hosts' home, only to find out they weren't there, they were working, and wouldn't be home until much later. The guests ended up having to make other, last minute arrangements in an expensive tourist area. That \$20 a night turned out to be quite a bit more.

In both cases, the members are now understandably weary of trying the network again, which is unfortunate for all of us.

So please, make sure that if you are hosting, you are at home when your guests are expected to arrive and if you are guest and have been delayed, you let your host know immediately. As long as we are all the type of guest we would want to host and vice versa, it will all run smoothly.
